# Report on the implementation of AEWA for the period 2009-2011

The format for reports on the implementation of the Agreement on the Conservation of African-Eurasian Migratory Waterbirds (AEWA) for the period 2009-2011 was approved at the 4th session of the Meeting of the Parties (15-19 September 2008, Antananarivo, Madagascar) by Resolution 4.7. Further amendments were endorsed by the Standing Committee in August 2011 in accordance with operative paragraph 11 of Resolution 4.7. This format has been constructed following the AEWA Action Plan, the AEWA Strategic Plan 2009-2017 and resolutions of the Meeting of the Parties (MOP).

In accordance with Article V.1(c) of the Agreement on the Conservation of African-Eurasian Migratory Waterbirds, each Party shall prepare to each ordinary session of the MOP a National Report on its implementation of the Agreement and submit that report to the Agreement Secretariat not later than 120 days before the session of the MOP. The 5th Session of the Meeting of the Parties (MOP5) is taking place on 14-18 May 2012 in La Rochelle, France; therefore **the deadline for submission of National Reports is 14 January 2012**.

The AEWA National Reports 2009-2011 will be compiled and submitted through the CMS Family Online Reporting Facility, which is an online reporting tool for the whole CMS Family. However, AEWA will be the first of the CMS-related treaties to use the CMS Family Online Reporting System for its reporting to MOP5. The CMS Family Online Reporting System was developed in 2010-2011 by the UNEP-World Conservation Monitoring Centre (UNEP-WCMC) in close collaboration with and under the guidance of the UNEP/AEWA Secretariat.

As a new product, the system may still need some refining and improving, we therefore request your understanding: any feedback or suggestions on your side would be greatly appreciated.

The online reporting system offers flexibility and versatility superior to the previously used paper-based reporting and the UNEP/AEWA Secretariat hopes that the Parties will find it to be more convenient and efficient. In particular, it will make information more easily accessible and also enhance ways of using it. In this context, Resolution 4.7 also requests UNEP to assist in the development of an analytical tool and calls upon Parties to support this initiative and provide financial resources and thus strengthen the online format for national reporting in collaboration with UNEP-WCMC. The online reporting system brings national reporting to a different level, enabling the information provided to be used much more effectively; it also serves as a tool for self-assessment by Parties. In addition, it can help to enhance cooperation and coordination between various stakeholders in your country by making the national reporting more of a collective, collaborative and continuous process.





> Introduction of alien wild species into nature on the territory of the Republic of Croatia is forbidden, but exceptionally it can be authorized by the competent authority (Nature Protection Directorate) if scientifically and technically founded and acceptable from the standpoint of nature protection and sustainable management. The permit shall be issued on grounds of a study on the assessment of the risk of introduction into nature, but it is a subject to prior approval from the minister competent for agriculture, forestry and water management. All of the provisions are proscribed in the Ordinance on production and conduction of the study on risk assessment related to introduction, re-introduction and breeding of wild taxa (Official Gazette No. 35/08). Import of live specimens of alien species is regulated in more details within the Ordinance on transboundary movement and trade of protected wild species (OG 72/09). Breeding of the alien wild species in controlled environment which impede the inhabiting of natural environment is not deemed as introduction. The import permit shall be issued if introduction of alien species into nature of the Republic of Croatia is already permitted or breeding in controlled environment which impede the inhabiting of natural environment. is permitted. In other cases, the request for import has to be considered in a more detailed way taking into account the opinion of the relevant scientific authority, especially in relation to possible adverse impact of that alien species on native fauna and flora. In the case of incidental introduction of alien species, or if there is a grounded suspicion that such introduction is to occur, the Minister shall prescribe the measures for proceeding with the scope of destroying, eradicating or preventing further propagation of introduced alien species. Enforcement is under the competence of the nature protection inspection which, in relation to alien wild species, cooperates with the hunting inspection, fishery inspection, etc.

Preparation and implementation of a National Strategy on invasive alien species is envisaged by the National Strategy for the Protection of Biological and Landscape Diversity of the Republic of Croatia (NSAP) (action plan 3.3.1.1.). NSAP recognizes IAS as one of the most important threats to the biological diversity. Nevertheless, existing legal framework provides certain basis to combat IAS. Nature Protection Act (OG 70/05, 139/08 and 57/11) in Article 91 forbids introduction of non-native species into nature on the territory of the Republic of Croatia and into ecological systems which they do not populate naturally. Also, should incidental introduction of non-native

species into the territory of the Republic of Croatia occur, or if there is a grounded suspicion that such introduction is to occur, the Minister shall by an order prescribe measures for proceeding with the purpose of destroying or preventing further propagation of introduced non-native species. Furthermore in the framework of the project supported by the WWF in course of 2010-2011 the Proposal for the development of a National Strategy on Invasive Alien Species in Croatia was developed.

Preventing illegal hunting is one of measures and as such is obligatory for hunting rightholders. Implementation of this measure in practice highly depends on number of hunting rangers in the hunting grounds as well as hunting inspectors and nature protection inspectors that is considered to be insufficient. Furthermore, much of the illegal hunting prevention depends upon education and conscience as well as the police surveillance/ presence in the field and cooperation between all parties included. Also, illegal hunting is a criminal offence according to current Criminal Code (OG 110/97) as well as new Criminal Code (OG 125/11) that will enter into force on 1st January 2013.

> Highly pathogenic avian influenza has not been detected in Croatia since 2006. There is a national program for detection of avian influenza viruses in wild birds since 2005. The program is laid down by the State veterinary administration and conducted by the Poultry Centre of the Croatian Veterinary Institute in collaboration with ornithologists. Each year 3,500 wild birds on average, primarily Anseriformes and Charadriiformes, are tested in Croatia for presence of avian influenza viruses.
